A Note from the President...

On behalf of the Board, I want to extend a warm post-holiday greeting to all our fellow congregants. Hopefully 2011 will find you in good health and spirit with family and friends nearby.

As has been my practice I will use this column to inform the Congregation about what occurred at our most recent (December) Board meeting. The Board did approve a four-month extension of Rev. Barbara Child's contract (February-May). As of this date the formal contract addendum is still pending but on the assumption that all details are approved by her and the Board she will work with us regarding our Mission, Stewardship issues (financial and otherwise), Leadership Development, and Membership. The weekend format may change somewhat. We will keep everyone informed as the details are finalized. We have also scheduled a "Congregational Conversation" for Sunday, January 23rd with the 30th as a back-up date. The Board wants to have a dialogue with the Congregation about the transition that has been taking place and where we hope to be going in the future. A representative from the Heartland District UUA may come to help facilitate our discussion. If they are unavailable we may coordinate with Rev. Child and schedule a meeting for Jan 16. Stay tuned.

One of the topics of discussion will be options for the future ministry here at UUCGT (see Rev. Child's September report pgs 10-11). As we move into 2011, it is time to move into the next phase of the transition year. While the Board has not taken any formal action a general consensus is that we should begin the planning process regarding an interim minister. A Congregational meeting is a step in that planning process. Other possible items to discuss could include

the upcoming visit with Rev. Child and what might evolve from those monthly sessions. At our December meeting the Board continued its discussion of Outreach efforts. It was noted that the Community Needs Committee is taking the initiative to inform the Congregation as to where the donated monies are going and who is benefiting from them. This is a good start; perhaps in the future a representative from one of the Agencies can come and talk with us about how we fit into the larger picture. Maura updated us on the Green Cemetery Project. That Committee has requested from the Estate monies that could be used to hire a professional consultant to evaluate the feasibility of the Project. More to follow.

Finally, I want to thank the Board and especially the Staff for all their hard work these past few months. As always, I also applaud all of the many congregants who have worked hard to maintain the creative vitality and viability of UUCGT. It speaks well to the character of the individuals who come here and participate in the Congregational life.

On a more personal note, as some of you already know, I recently (12-18) celebrated my 70th birthday. Many thanks for the warm wishes at a recent Wednesday night supper. I will also be "celebrating" the 3rd anniversary of my 2007 Xmas eve heart attack. I seem to be fine. Take my medicine, exercise, have an occasional glass of red wine and drink some stout at Right Brain Brewery. Oh well...

PRI Report to the Community

Have you been part of the effort to reduce poverty in our region? Then please join others at the Poverty Reduction Initiative Report to the Community 2011, Tuesday, February 1, 2011: 7:30 a.m. to Noon. Breakfast will be served at the Hagerty Center, Traverse City, 715 East Front Street. No cost to attend.

Many have been working together since 2004 to reduce poverty in the Traverse Bay region, including Antrim, Benzie, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, and Leelanau counties. Information compiled by Northwest Michigan Council of Governments will provide a picture of where we have been, where we are, and where we will go next. 2nd Collaborative Mentor Training: If you are interested in mentoring adults, this is one of the first parts of the necessary training. Research shows that mentoring makes a difference, not only with youth, but also with adults. Family Partnership Program, one of the partners in this collaborative effort, has seen that over 50% of our adult partners have started toward, maintained or achieved first-time homeownership since participating in our mentoring program. Other collaborators in this training include Goodwill Street Outreach,

AGAPE Financial, Women's Resource, Michigan Prisoner Re-entry Initiative, Habitat for Humanity and Michigan Youth opportunities Initiative. SOCIAL JUSTICE AND ACTION

January 2011

Happy New Year, but I do not feel it will be an easy one or necessarily very happy for many. There are very hard times ahead and the balance scales are tilting everyday away from relief for the disenfranchised. And more people are added everyday to the relief rolls, which are getting almost too long to count. It can become easily overwhelming and the temptation to become an ostrich and hide is forever present. But take one corner that you can fathom and start chopping away. To tackle it all would be really impossible, but to tackle one area, might lead to some success!

One area, here in our town of Traverse City, has to do with a vote the UUCGT took many years ago. When the gays, lesbians, transvestites, etc, among us and in our city were being discriminated against, we voted to be a Welcoming Congregation. And we have, I hope, for the most part, remained open and welcoming to all! I feel welcomed, and I am not a run of the mill. None of us are. We all stand for what we feel and believe.

The challenge is coming again. Ten years ago, at the urging of the Human Rights committee (I was chair at that time) we encouraged the TC City Commission to pass a resolution that upheld the rights of all. That was the

birth of the “We are Traverse City” bumper stickers. I still have stickers if you want some.

This past year, the now Human Rights Commission and the TC Commissioners turned that resolution into law. It is legally binding that no one shall discriminate on issues that include gender orientation. You cannot mandate feelings, but you can mandate behavior, and hopefully the next generation will feel more warmly inclined one towards the other.

Of course with the ordinance passing, opposition began at once. There is a petition gathering enough signatures to get it on the ballot for next fall. We have done this before and overcome those that would discriminate. Can we muster together and do it again? Can we fight for understanding, acceptance of differences, and love for all. Can we still stand together, no matter what people adamantly in their anti-gay phobias scream at us? We have before, and we have to again. Please unite with me and let us be prepared! Think hard and let me know you will join me for fighting for the rights of us all. Our congregation voted for us all ten years ago. Let us reaffirm that now! Remember *Rev. Martin Minelayer*. In this world we must all stand together.

Being Liberal In an Illiberal Age UUCGT Saturday Course Facilitated by Rev Barbara Childs 12-11-10

Eleven members were in attendance and we continued with the following chapters from Mendelson’s book: *Being Liberal In An Illiberal Age: Why I Am A Unitarian:*

Chapter 7—The Who What And Where Of God

We worked in pairs, small groups, larger group and spent more time writing to a prompt individually as we went deeper and engage in knowing in new ways. We had comfort within the group, it seemed, such that we responded quickly to prompts and freely share what we had written, such that we could write to the prompt “God is. . . .”

We wrote at length, explored freely, and benefited from hearing our diverse voices.

Further perspectives & excerpts were

explored from the chapter:

- Baruch Spinoza, 1600’s who sought an experience of God acceptable to people of reason, a God of nature rather than of revelation?
- James Luther Adams, foremost contemporary UU theologian---focuses on the love of God, which we give back in service—belief is nothing without putting it into action.
- Rosemary Radford Reuther, feminist Christian, Catholic—encounter with God/ess is encounter with authentic self, other people, and nature.
- Religious humanists all the way from Protagoras in 450 BCE saying: As for Gods, I do not know whether they exist or not---humans are the measure of all things. To Bertrand Russell---no supernatural reasons needed—no savior needed—no supernatural judge needed for us to be good.

Mendelson takes a stand as well by the end of the chapter; we were encouraged to start developing our stand—our faith stance.

Chapter 8--- With Their Own Eyes

Mendelson states, “Of all the good reasons I can list for being a Unitarian Universalist, none is more personally exciting to me than our work with children and youth.” Discussion in large and paired groupings led to the following brainstorm of ideas to share with our Director of Religious Ed. for Children and Youth:

- Develop a knowledge base: cultural literacy; UU literacy; religious traditions of the world; truth and justice; living UUA; research and build a UU profile of a personal hero; compilation of personal truth journals (e. g. How to treat others); compilation of personal gratitude journals.
- Experience: acting upon and living values; ethical principles; covenant relationships; “church of the younger fellowship”; Seven Virtues, such as Rev. Galen Gingerich; keeping community; meaningful rituals of faith traditions; listening; conflict resolution.
- Teach: models for question and answer dialogue; mentoring/life skills; how human systems work; through webinars from around the country; critical thinking, listening; creating a youth based service.
