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Is Our Church Gay? Gay Rights and Religious Education

For the first few weeks of October, our RE classes will focus on justice-making through the democratic process, and the importance of working towards equality for all people, including all sexual orientations and gender identities. These activities, designed to be age-appropriate, will help our young folk to explore the First and Fifth Principles of Unitarian Universalism.

We will be talking about love and family rather than human sexuality, and about how working towards justice for all is an inherent component of living our Unitarian Universalist faith.

These activities will also include developmentally appropriate information about the bullying that often occurs because of people's actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity, and how to combat it. The current challenge to the anti-discrimination ordinance in Traverse City is an example of bullying on an adult, civic scale, and our children and youth will explore ways that they can work towards justice on this issue, with the understanding that (in the Rev. Dr. King's words) "injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere."

The Rev. Meg Riley, minister of the Church of the Larger Fellowship, wrote a helpful pamphlet on talking to children about these subjects, called "Is Our Church Gay? Answering Children's Questions about Homophobia and Sexual Orientation." She describes five different stages that children go through as they develop their comprehension, and she provides easy language for addressing children's questions.

SOCIAL JUSTICE AND ACTION

You don't have to like everyone. No one does. I don't. We usually like people who have compatible personalities with ours, people who have the same interests that we have, people we enjoy doing things with. Some people we just don't like. That's okay. But to just not like someone because of who they are, something that they have no power over—that does not make sense. We are all born with certain characteristics, like nationality, color of our skin, sexuality, etc. You can change your religion, but if people want to hate you for your religion, they don't care if you have changed it or not. They will hate you for being the religion you were born into. We call that blind hate, hate for NO good reason. You don't have to like everyone, but to hate them for something they have no power over is a waste of your energy and unpleasant for all! As the song goes: You have to be taught to love and to hate.

These days there is a lot of hate fuming under the surface. Some of this hate is because some have succeeded, and they happen to have been born with darker skin color than others. Skin color or race is something that some waste lots of hateful energy on. Sexual orientation is another. Whether you like it or not, people are born being straight or gay, etc. If you don't think so, you who are straight, try being gay, not just one event but for months. Can you change yourself? NO. So why expect those who are gay to change themselves? And why bother to be mad about it and hateful to them? They cannot change so why waste energy being angry? Who you love is private, and something we all hope we can enjoy!

If you believe that is against God, I have faith that God can take care of God's own ways. We do not need to do it for God. God would not want us to be hateful here on earth because of what

we think God believes. God teaches; "love thy neighbor as thyself!"

This November 8, we in Traverse City get to vote on whether we think all different kinds of people deserve protection under the law. This vote sets the attitude throughout northern lower Michigan. The way TC goes, so goes the region. A vote YES means that gays, lesbians, transgendered will be protected against discrimination in education, jobs, housing, and public housing like motels. Most of us are protected against discrimination, so why should not gays also be protected? This is nothing special. This is giving them the same protection we all have now. All but gays have this protection now. We need to vote YES, and get your neighbors and friends to do the same. If you can help please come and help us win this ballot issue. It is a non-partisan issue.

During the next few weeks before the election, you will hear a lot of rhetoric against this and a lot of fear will be talked about as if it came direct from God and what it might do to us. These words are from other people who have their own agendas against gays. They come mainly from downstate and all across the nation to fight this in our yard. They give lots of money and talk a lot about God and what it will do if this ballot issue passes. Many cities in Michigan have equal rights for all, including gays, etc. Many states in the nation have these equal rights also. Some cities that have passed laws to keep discrimination legal, keep hate on their law books, have lost lots of business. Conventions and many businesses left town or cancelled their meetings there, etc. Look for example at Cincinnati, etc.

We need fair laws, no discrimination against anyone!
